Older and wiser. That is how I would describe Western Youth Network (WYN) as I reflect on 2018, our 33rd year of existence.

This year, we, along with other leaders and scientists in the youth development community, have discovered even more about how difficult experiences in childhood can cause life-long harm. Childhood toxic stress has been found to negatively impact the human body and even the brain itself, leading many to compare its effects to **Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD)**.

Yet, even as we have learned more about the harmful consequences of childhood trauma, we have learned about the power that relationships with stable, supportive and nurturing adults have to heal trauma. We have discovered that nurturing adults and environments help youth heal from painful experiences while building resilience to regulate their emotions and bounce back in future tough situations.

With this incredible and empowering knowledge in mind, WYN turned to you, our dedicated supporters, and **asked for your help bringing WYN's trauma-informed care to more High Country youth.** Because of your generosity and commitment to a brighter future for all youth in our community, WYN was able to expand its professional services to younger and older populations last year. As you will see in the WYNning Moments of 2018 section of this report, WYN grew leaps and bounds to help vulnerable youth reach their full potential.

Throughout 2018, WYN also continued to tackle substance addiction, including the demon that is on everyone's mind--opioid addiction. We know that addiction's seeds are too often planted by childhood trauma. Using a powerful combination of education and policy change, **WYN is working to give our children a better chance in the fight against addiction**.

Though we are doing so much to heal and prevent childhood trauma and its consequences, so much more must be done to prepare and empower our children to achieve their dreams.

In the year to come, WYN hopes to further answer the needs of our youth by:

- 1. Hiring a certified counselor who will cultivate resilience and healing in the students WYN serves
- 2. Expanding WYN's therapeutic after school program to Kindergarten through fifth graders to ensure a seamless continuum of care from the time a child enters school until the time they graduate. Early intervention is key to making lasting change.

It also includes after school program expansion to K-5th grades, as earlier intervention has been shown to improve children's chances for success.

We are all stronger when we work together. In 2018, Appalachian State Athletics selected WYN to be one of their two non-profit community partners. WYN hopes that the partnership will create opportunities for meaningful learning experiences for our youth while introducing more community members to our programs and needs, particularly our need for mentors. In just one year, AppState Athletics has contributed to WYN's youth development in several major ways:

- promoting student-athlete mentor and volunteer engagement
- hosting 52 WYN youth and their mentors at an AppState home football game
- interviewing WYN's Executive Director on ESPN+ live football coverage
- teaching WYN after school students about college athletics through a student-athlete-led facilities tour

WYN Launches High School Success Program

No longer will our WYN students go to Watauga High School without us. At the 2018 Wish Upon a Star Gala, our donors made it possible for WYN to create a new program at Watauga High. In September, WYN hired the magnetic Kimberly Kop to trailblaze a new way for WYN in partnership with the incredible teachers and student services staff working at the high school.

In her first semester, Kim grew the program to serve approximately 35 WYN alumni in her role that is now known as the High School Success Coach. She has four primary goals:

- 1. to build upon the gains made in WYN's middle school programs through relationship and availability
- 2. to engage students in on-campus opportunities and to connect them to helpful community resources
- 3. to facilitate a pilot Vocational Mentoring program for students in need of positive role models and mentoring relationships in the context of meaningful work experiences
- 4. to assist WHS in becoming more trauma-informed in its culture, programming, and implementation

Being a teenager in a large school is difficult for everyone, even those who have the strongest support systems. It is nearly impossible for those trying to navigate alone. With this new program, our WYN students have a role model and supportive adult to guide them in the right direction, leading to greater graduation outcomes.

Mentoring

Through our community-based program and school-based program, affectionately called "Lunch Buddies," adult volunteers in the community are paired with a youth in need of a friend and role model. These mentors help guide and encourage their mentees through the highs and lows of growing up. WYN's mentoring program is active in both Watauga and Avery Counties.



5,300 hours of mentoring

After School









WYN provides the *only* after-school program for middle school youth in Watauga County. Programming focuses on social and behavioral development, academic improvement, physical and mental health, art education, as well as community engagement. Most youth are referred to WYN by school counselors and social workers. **Nearly 90%** of the youth enrolled in during 2018 attended at no cost to their families. Due to transportation constraints, 11 youth are currently on the program wait list.







During WYN's 6-week summer program, our campers built a strong and uplifting community. In an environment with appropriate challenges and empowering support systems, the youth developed critical confidence and character they can carry with them for the rest of their lives. Thanks in part to the Sonny Sweet Scholarship Fund, 68% of youth attended WYN's summer camp on a full or partial scholarship.

Preventing Youth Substance Use through Partnerships

With the Drug Free Communities (DFC) Grant to prevent youth substance use in Watauga County, WYN has been instrumental in the creation and ongoing success of the Watauga Substance Abuse Prevention Coalition. The Coalition is a partnership of health professionals, educators, faith leaders, law enforcement officials, and more working together to create a healthier community. Since the Coalition began in 2009, Watauga County has seen significant decreases in youth substance use:

48.8%

decrease in reported high school alcohol use

37.3%

decrease in reported high school marijuana use





E-cigarette Smoking Crisis

WYN collaborated with Appalachian State University and Watauga County Schools to educate the community about the dangers of e-cigarettes using such avenues as the YES! Adult Leader and the Catch My Breath best practice curricula. WYN also supported policies, handouts, school signage, and more in order to raise community awareness about this emerging public health crisis and to change the environment.

Opioid Crisis

Dr. Don Teater facilitated a workshop titled "Treating Pain Safer: Fewer Opioids and Better Results - Controlled Substances Education for Prescribers" in order for participants to identify best practices in regards to the CDC prescribing guidelines. Between Ashe and Avery, Dr. Teater trained 22 healthcare professionals.
